AURORA ENERGY HERE TO HELP CUSTOMERS ON ELECTRICITY PRICES

THE independent Tasmanian Economic Regulator has today announced that prices will increase for both Aurora Energy residential and small business customers for 2023-24.

On average prices will increase by 9.51 per cent, primarily driven by high wholesale energy costs, with a range of recent national and global events placing significant upwards pressure on the wholesale energy market in Australia.

These increases will not be unique to Tasmania, and energy customers around the country will likely face much higher price hikes, many in the vicinity of 20-29 per cent, with some major providers' prices increasing even more.

While the news is better in Tasmania, Aurora Energy CEO Nigel Clark acknowledged the difficulty already being felt by customers and wanted to reassure that Aurora is here to help.

"We know today's news is going to make it very tough on some individuals and families who are already struggling to make ends meet," Mr Clark said.

"As Tasmanians ourselves, we understand the difficulty already being felt by Tassie homes and businesses. We have more support than ever to help Tasmanians doing it tough.

"We encourage any customer who may be struggling to keep on top of their energy bill and are in need of support to get in contact. The sooner they get in touch, the sooner we can help.

"As Tasmania's 100 per cent owned and operated energy retailer, we're committed to remaining true to who we are at our core – Tasmanians supporting Tasmanians." Support includes payment extensions, payment plans, direct financial assistance through the Aurora Customer Support Fund and relief through the nationally recognised Your Energy Support (YES) program, which provides tailored support

for customers in hardship.

aurora+ is also available at no additional cost to enable all Tasmanians to better understand and control usage to help keep energy costs down.

"Inefficient energy use is a key driver of high power bills, which is why we're focussed on helping customers become more energy efficient through practical solutions and tools," Mr Clark said.

Last week Aurora Energy announced a further \$200,000 contribution to top up the Tasmanian Government's energy hardship fund, administered by The Salvation Army, to directly support customers who need an extra hand to pay their energy bill. In addition, the Tasmanian Government has partnered with the Commonwealth Government to provide \$90M in bill relief to eligible households and small businesses from 1 July, with households to receive \$250 annually over two years and small businesses \$650 in 2023-24. The Annual Electricity Concession will increase by 9.51 per cent to a total of \$629 per year.

The Regulator also announced the Feed-in Tariff rate for customers with solar installations will be increased to 10.869c/kWh due to the increase in the wholesale electricity price for 2023-24.

GOVERNMENT DIVIDED ON FORCED COUNCIL MERGERS

Jeremy Rockliff's minority Liberal Government is facing more disunity and division – with one of their MPs threatening to cross the floor over their forced amalgamations of Tasmania's councils.

Liberal MLC Jane Howlett told a community meeting that she would cross the floor to vote against any amalgamation of their council and has today tweeted that she

doesn't support forced council amalgamations.

Ms Howlett is obviously getting the same feedback as Labor from communities that are terrified of losing their local voice, local jobs and local services and paying more in rates*.

Former Liberal Party strategist Brad Stansfield recently wrote an article titled "Merge and Be Damned" – and anonymous Liberal sources keep raising forced mergers as a source of frustration from the party base.

Jeremy Rockliff's wrong priorities mean he has no control of his party room and has already lost two members to the cross-bench, and numerous votes on the floor of parliament this week.

How many more MPs are going to walk out on Rockliff's minority government – and how much more chaos can Tasmanians expect before the government collapses altogether and causes yet another early election?

Labor agrees with comments made in 2019 by former Premier Peter Gutwein who said: *"The Government continues to not support forced council amalgamations as we believe amalgamations stand the best chance of success when processes are voluntary and have support of their communities."*

*Nic Street on Leon Compton on ABC radio on April 20: *"The one thing you will not hear me promise, Leon, is that amalgamations will reduce rates for ratepayers because that simply is not the case. And it's not been the experience anywhere. We're not talking about reducing rates ... for me this has never been about cost cutting for ratepayers."*

LETTERS TO THE EDITORIAL TEAM

Dear Editorial Team

We have sent the following to Council and Councillors and provide this in addition to the community following Dr Robyn Moore's letter from last week. Further to the letter one of our group sent last week we felt that an additional explanation may benefit, demonstrating how a Council's AAV, or Assess Annual Value, impacts its grant allocation, to further everyone's understanding of the grant allocation methodology of the State Grant Commission (SGC). There are nuances in the calculations however the biggest influence on the grant is the AAV, the Government assessed annual value of a property,

vs Break O' Day (BOD). SM and BOD have very similar populations however SM receives a higher grant than BOD. SM has a lower AAV than BOD and therefore a lower revenue earning capacity, ergo has a higher needs requirement (Column B-A), and a higher grant allocation follows. With this initial guide, the table is self-explanatory.

The increases in property values in GSBC have been celebrated by Council in recent history, with news stories linked on this very topic on the GSBC website. The increased AAV seems to have come at a cost of our grant share. As has been stated over prior years by GSBC, the GSBC grant has been reducing over time. The increasing AAV appears to be the main cause of this.

In summary, on paper GSBC simply does not have the same needs as the other re-

The accompanying table uses the selected Council grant allocations that Glamorgan Spring Bay Council (GSBC) have been posting online and in the Great Oyster Bay News, to show that GSBC receives less grants than other Councils. Without the additional information we have provided on our table, on the face of it this does appear unfair. Once you include the additional data you can see that there is logic to the allocation system and the complaints coming from GSBC have not considered the entire picture and merely looked at the final allocation.

An example is Southern Midlands (SM)

regions, due to the high AAV per capita (see final column). GSBC is a standout in this column, as highlighted. Michael Ferguson recently quite clearly explained this situation when John Tucker raised the issue in the House of Assembly on the June 6th 2023.


Given GSBC do not appear to have need for a grant, and clearly the SGC are not to blame for the GSBC woes, we all next need to consider why GSBC cries poor.

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


