### BUSHFIRE INSIGHTS UNCOVERED WITH NEW FIRE-ATMOSPHERE MODELLING

New research is offering insights into the destructive Black Summer bushfires in 2019-20, which were at times driven by complex interactions between the fire and the atmosphere that produced extreme local fire behaviour.

Cutting edge research led by Dr Mika Peace from the Bureau of Meteorology and the Bushfire and Natural Hazards CRC has used advanced super-computer simulations that combine bushfire behaviour and meteorology to investigate why the Badja Forest (New South Wales), Green Valley Talmalmo/Corryong (NSW/Victoria), Kangaroo Island (South Australia), Stanthorpe (Queensland) and Yanchep (Western Australia) bushfires were so extraordinary and challenging to firefighters.

"The research uses two linked models to help us understand the processes driving these challenging and destructive fires — one which simulates the fire and one which simulates the weather, so by combining them we can see how both the fire and weather change in response to each other," Dr Peace said.

"It's only possible to research the fire behaviour resulting from these interactions between the fire and the weather, such as extreme, local winds and rotating fire plumes through work like this.

"As we learn and share these findings, we are able to apply our knowledge to future bushfires. Right now, we can use the findings to help fire behaviour analysts and fire meteorologists recognise the conditions that lead to extremely dangerous localised bushfire behaviour."

Research shows that the drought and heatwave conditions experienced in the lead up to and during all five fires were a key factor in priming the landscape for extreme fire behaviour, but local weather conditions were also important when combined with the very dry vegetation.

Unusual fire activity occurred in the overnight period, when fire intensity and rate of spread is typically expected to decrease. Interactions between strong winds above the ground, topography and the fire plume circulation were key drivers accelerating surface fire spread at night.

"The conventional understanding of bushfire behaviour will tell you that fire activity will decrease overnight as the temperature drops, humidity rises and winds become lighter," Dr Peace explained.

"The modelling shows that very strong low-level winds descending to the ground behind the fire plume were a critical reason why the Badja Forest and Corryong bushfires burnt so fast overnight."

Pyrocumulonimbus (pyroCb) clouds or fire generated thunderstorms were a feature of the 2019-20 fire season and the number of pyroCb clouds recorded was an Australian record for one season. However, the five fires examined were not all associated with pyroCb's, highlighting that it is not the sole weather phenomenon associated with extreme fire behaviour.

The simulations show that the fire-affected wind near a fire plume can be much stronger than the background winds and that destructive winds can occur, including extreme fire-front winds and fire generated vortices.

"For the bushfires that occurred close to the coast – Yanchep in Western Australia and on Kangaroo Island – the combination of heatwave conditions, the temperature difference between the hot land and the cooler water and local topography led to complex winds that changed the bushfire behaviour," Dr Peace explained.

Sea breezes, the local environment, and other such conditions caused erratic, variable winds along active fire lines which at times stretched for several kilometres.

The bushfire simulations undertaken through this research use the Australian Community Climate and Earth System Simulator Fire (ACCESS-Fire) model and are run on the National Computing Infrastructure supercomputer in Canberra.

The results show the benefits of enhanced simulation capability and supercomputer power. Due to the level of detail, data and computer power required it is currently not possible to model bushfire behaviour like this when bushfires are burning.

This research was a partnership between the Bushfire and Natural Hazards CRC and the Bureau of Meteorology and was conducted in close collaboration with fire and land management agencies in each state.

The project highlights the complexity of the fire environment and fire management and shows how a coordinated multidisciplinary approach can make effective fire behaviour predictions.

This research was part of the Bushfire and Natural Hazards CRC's Black Summer research program, funded by the Australian Government and the CRC to investigate key issues from the 2019-20 bushfire season. The research team consisted of Dr Mika Peace, Barry Hanstrum, Dr Jesse Greenslade, Dr Dragana Zovko-Rajak, Dr Abhik Santra, Dr Jeffrey Kepert, Dr Paul Fox-Hughes, Dr Harvey Ye, Tasfia Shermin and Jeffrey Jones from the Bureau of Meteorology.

#### **BUREAU EXPERT EXPLAINS GIANT HAIL PHENOMENON**

Following a week of severe thunderstorms that produced giant hail across parts of Queensland and New South Wales, one of Australia's most accomplished hail researchers has explained how tiny stones can grow to the size of a ten-cent piece, a cricket ball or even the record-breaking size of a mango.

Hail can occur at any time of the year, but for large hailstones to form, conditions must be just right.

According to the Bureau of Meteorology's Dr Joshua Soderholm, in Australia, severe hailstorms are most common during spring and early summer.

"This is a time of the year when surface temperatures are warm enough to promote the development of intense thunderstorms, but you also need the accompanying ingredients of strong winds and cool air in the upper atmosphere to support hail growth," Dr Soderholm said.

Earlier this month, the Bureau confirmed that a hailstone, which fell near Yalboroo to the North of Mackay in Queensland, had established a new Australian record.

Hailstones measuring 16 centimetres in diameter were observed, eclipsing the previous record of 14 centimetres set in 1991 in Kempsey, New South Wales and again in 2020 in southeast Queensland.

A recent storm at Coffs Harbour in New South Wales also produced large accumulations of small hail leaving what appeared to be a layer of snow on the ground.

"Hail starts as water vapour near the ground. This condenses into tiny water droplets, cooling as it rises inside a thunderstorm updraft, collecting really cold water that's below freezing," Dr Soderholm said.

"This freezing water is called supercooled water and the longer the droplets and eventually ice - fly through the supercooled water within the hailstorm updraft, the bigger it grows.

"So, whenever you see giant or large amounts of hail on the ground, a lot has had to happen for it to get there. It is also why there is not hail in every storm."

Severe thunderstorms that may produce hail will continue about parts of the country this week.

The Bureau urges the community to

#### MEREDITH RIVER PEDISTRIAN BRIDGE

Letter to the editorial team

I am astonished that Council apparently rejected a proposal for a cycle/pedestrian bridge across the Meredith River on the derisory basis of maintenance and/or insurance issues. The decision of Council goes against plainly established trends in other local Councils in Australia and overseas to support and provide safe pedestrian and cycling paths and to take pressure off the

Pedestrians walking along the beach from either Swansea or from Dolphin Sands can in the 'right conditions' cross the Meredith River at the mouth. However the route across the sea mouth of the Meredith River is fraught due to tides, weather and flows of the river. I have only been able to negotiate this access once this year. I, as well as, many others can only look wistfully across the River when the current route is impassable.

The case for the construction of this safe all season non-vehicular access into town is overwhelming. Residential development in Swansea and Dolphin Sands has been substantial over the years. The current level of building activity in Dolphin Sands in particular ensures that the whole area is likely to be built out within the foreseeable future, increasing local pressure for safe pedestrian and cycling access to Swansea and to Dolphin Sands.

The benefits of the Bridge to the broader East Coast community should also not be underestimated. Cycling and Walking holidays are popular the world over and increasingly are a determinant in people's choice of holiday destinations. With increased tourism to the area come greater opportunities for business and employment, as well as, increased revenue for Council. The Bridge deserves to have a high priority for action in the Glamorgan Spring Bay Council's Strategic Plan.

In his letter to the Editor (5 October, 2021) Barry Smith refers to the Council's financial predicament. It is clearly important that Council manages its limited finances responsibly, but surely this must include sound investment for the future, such as

the construction of this bridge provides. Furthermore, it would seem that there is little downside risk to Council, as there are State and Federal Grants available to fund this type of infrastructure.

Please Councillors, in the interests of current and future residents, support and submit an Application for a Grant to construct the Bridge and get the job done.

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

# DO YOU KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A BUSHFIRE THREATENS YOUR AREA?

As the Tasmanian fire season approaches, it's important to have a plan and know your options.

Community Bushfire Protection Planning is an innovative, national award-winning initiative which assists in identifying safety options during a bushfire threat. The Tasmania Fire Service work

closely with communities, local government, service providers, and other government agencies to create a *Community Bushfire Protection Plan* and implement risk management strategies. Each Plan is tailored to the individual community to best suit its needs.

Tasmania Fire Service's Bushfire Risk Mitigation Manager, Chris Collins said it was important for people to be prepared, regardless of whether they choose to stay at their property or leave it. "Understanding risks and taking steps to mitigate them is important for all members of the community, but especially those living in bushfire prone areas. "We want to make sure that people are informed, prepared and ready for when a bushfire strikes," he said.

Community Bushfire Protection Plans provide advice on what to do:

- Before the fire;
- When fires are likely or nearby; and
- After the fire.

There are currently 133 Community Bushfire Protection Plans in place across the state, with 9 new plans being developed this year for release prior to the fire season in Wynyard, Turners Beach, Premaydena, Pioneer, Mawbanna, Beaconsfield, Arthurs Lake, Bruny Island and Oatlands. Additionally, 6 existing plans have been updated in Coles Bay, Snug, Conningham, Falmouth, Sisters Beach, Weymouth. Please note that the existing Snug and Conningham plans have been amalgamated into the updated Snug plan, and that the existing Adventure Bay, Alonnah and North Bruny plans have been amalgamated into the new Bruny Island Plan.



**AUDIENCES** to previous eccai concerts will have enjoyed the wonderful sounds of the viola playing of both Will Newbery and Janet Rutherford in different concerts and recitals over the past few years

The viola can be thought of as the tenor of the strings and on the 14<sup>th</sup> of November at 2.30 at Kennedia eccai will be presenting not the three tenors but FOUR violas (and the piano) in works by Mozart, Shostakovich, Bach, York Bowen and Don Kays.

This is your opportunity to hear wonderful music played by a combination not very often heard

The group comprises Damien Holloway, Mo Nagayama, Mary Self, Jess Wright and guest Angus Deeth.

#### A letter from Damien Holloway

Have you ever heard four violas play together? The programme being performed at Kennedia on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> November had its genesis when violists Damien, Mo, Jess and Mary decide to read through the most significant work for that combination, written in 1907 in late romantic style by the eccentric Englishman, York Bowen. In spite of the obscurity of this magnificent quartet, the four were overwhelmed by the imaginative writing, and the versatility and virtuosity and of the four-viola combination. Deciding it had to be performed, they sought other high-quality works for four violas, with only a little success in the miniature "Adagio" by Matthias Durst, a gem from the mid 19<sup>th</sup> Century.

Then came the inspiration to ask Tasmania's foremost living composer, Don Kay, to write us a work. Reviewer Peter Donnelly wrote of its premiere earlier this year, "It immediately made a strong impression in this committed performance... the heart of the work was the wonderfully otherworldly second movement". Don's work has inspired other local composers to write viola quartets, a short one by Simon Reade will be included in the programme.

These quartets are complemented by some other works featuring viola: movements respectively from Mozart's 'Kegelstatt' trio, and Shostakovich's viola sonata, both showing off very different qualities of the instrument. We are sure you will be surprised by the range of sounds that violas can offer.


